

Isaac Watts (1674-1748). His father was imprisoned for his non-conformist views. Isaac too became a 'Dissenter', refusing a university place which were only for members of the established church, ie the Anglican church. He became pastor of Mark Lane Chapel, London. A tiny figure, '...yet the gravity and propriety of his utterances made his discourses very efficacious' wrote Dr. Johnson. His hymns, initially read out to the congregation line by line were immensely popular and he still ranks as one of the greatest and most popular of the English hymn-writers.



The bible has many references to olives, olive oil and olive trees. The dove brought back in its beak a fresh olive leaf, symbol of the receding of the flood waters and God's lifting of his curse on the earth (Gen 8:11 & 21). In Isaiah 41:19 we read; 'I will make cedars grow in the desert, and acacias and myrtles and olive trees. Forests will grow in barren lands ...'

The importance of the olive tree in Mediterranean lands is incalculable - good Italian olive oil is superb!

## MEET PARISHIONER JAMES HADLEY



James was born and educated in the USA where his parents, Tom and Janet, brother Scott and family still live. After doctorate studies in Ireland he attended the Greg in Rome. He was received into the Church of England at All Saints' recently. He told the newsletter: I started thinking about ordination when I was 11. I am now in the discernment process for ordinands in the Diocese of Europe. I believe that God has an incredible dream for every human on earth, which is about healing, wholeness and incredible joy. Christian discipleship and mission is about helping others discover and live out this reality. My faith is centred around helping others live a profound life of meaning, dedication and service through Jesus Christ, amidst the extreme physical and spiritual disconnect in the world. Faith in Jesus offers a sense of being tightly held by a God and a people who love tremendously. This has been my experience and I try to share it with others day to day.

I'd like to see All Saints' build as a place of welcome so that our community is known as a place of Christian acceptance, belonging and nurturing. Personally I pray to know and have the strength to do the will of God. Should I be ordained I pray to contribute to the life of tions, no depth to me. Like St. Paul I don't see the Church through pastoral and liturgical ministry so the beauty of God might bring many to know the Lord.

In Italy I love the revelation of centuries of Christian belief in its art, architecture, manuscripts and music, evidencing both the genius of humanity and the glory of God. But bureaucratic dysfunction is the downside! My favourite holiday destination is the pacific island of Moloka'i where you can see an eternity of stars away from the lights of civilization. Ideally I would be eating a Ribeye steak and drinking Saint-Emilion Grand Cru!

She was instrumental in the organization and leadership of a course held recently at the Anglican Centre here in Rome. Entitled 'Female Leadership in the Church: Past, Present and Future.' Many of the early martyrs in Rome were women who left a lasting spiritual heritage on the Christian community, still celebrated today - Agnes, Prisca, Sabina. GARDENING ROMA

Welcome to the column that tells you what plants succeed here and how to look after them. Plant of the month for October -Oleander - They grow wonderfully well on the sides of the motorway but in containers they can be more tricky so here's what to do:

1 Use a good sized pot 30 - 60cm diameter.

2 Buy your plants or beg some cuttings 20 cm long. Place in a glass or jam jar. Change the water every three days. They will send out roots (top rt) in 2-3 weeks. Pot up.

3 Multipurpose compost is needed. Do not allow it to dry out but neither have it soggy stand the pot on a plastic saucer with has three holes poked in base.

4 Water every two days in summer. Add two capfuls of cheap liquid fertiliser to 5 litres of water every fortnight
